I. Statement of Intent

This work is not merely a collection of symbols, nor a traditional oracle system. It is an attempt to articulate a unified vision of reality through a minimal and coherent symbolic language. The goal is not to explain reality, but to reveal its structure through form.

II. Philosophical Foundation

At its core, the system is rooted in non-duality: the understanding that all perceived distinctions arise within a single unified field of being. Separation is not fundamental, but perceptual. The self, the other, and the world are not truly divided, but appear so through the structures of perception.

III. Polarity and Unity

The system is structured around polarity: above and below, inner and outer, giver and receiver, form and formlessness. These are not opposites in conflict, but complementary expressions of a single reality. Meaning emerges through their relationship, not their isolation.

IV. Symbolic Primitives

All symbols are constructed from a small set of geometric primitives:

- The point: origin, presence, indivisibility
- The line: relation, division, direction
- The circle: unity, totality, containment
- The triangle: emergence, transformation, ascent

These primitives form the foundation of the entire system.

V. Symbolic Grammar

Each symbol adheres to a strict internal logic. Meaning is not assigned arbitrarily but emerges through transformation:

- Addition introduces complexity
- Removal reveals essence
- Doubling intensifies
- Displacement creates tension

- Inversion reveals reflection

Every modification alters meaning in a precise and intentional way.

VI. Atomic vs Composite Forms

Each card represents a fundamental gesture. Symbols remain as atomic as possible, avoiding unnecessary complexity. When multiple ideas are combined, it is done through clear and legible relationships, not layered ambiguity.

VII. Texture as Condition

While geometry defines structure, subtle variations in texture or clarity can express the condition of that structure. For example, distortion may indicate instability, illusion, or perceptual interference without introducing new forms.

VIII. The Role of the Viewer

This system does not function through instruction but through recognition. The viewer is not told what to think, but invited to see. Meaning is not delivered—it emerges through interaction.

IX. The System as a Whole

No symbol exists in isolation. Each relates to others, forming a network of meaning. The system is not linear but relational, with ideas reflecting, opposing, and resolving one another.

X. Completion and Openness

The system is complete in its structure, yet open in its interpretation. It does not close meaning but reveals its unfolding. Each engagement with the system is a re-entry into the same unified field from a different perspective.

XI. Final Reflection

This is not a system to be mastered. It is a system to be seen. Once recognized, it becomes less a tool and more a way of perceiving reality itself.
